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# ≈ Finding Stability — in a Changing World ≈ The Book of Colossians

Dear Friend,

Welcome, as you join us on our exploration of a simple, ancient letter written by the Apostle Paul to a small group of people we now call **the Colossians.** In the day this was written, their world was changing rapidly — and today, we're experiencing the same thing — a rapidly changing world! What a comfort to be reminded that God does not change — not one single bit — He is steadfast, immutable, unchanging, **stable!** 

I titled this study "Finding Stability" because there is true spiritual, emotional, and intellectual stability to be found by knowing Jesus and thinking accurately about who He is, what He has done, and what that means for ME!

Paul described this blessing as ...stable and steadfast, not shifting from the hope of the gospel that you heard... (Colossians 1:23)

His desire was that, as Christians focused on Jesus, they would be ...strengthened with all power...for all endurance and patience with joy. (Colossians 1:11)

The key words in the latter verse: *strengthen*, *power*, and *endurance*, express the by-products of *finding stability*. And one of the best avenues toward realizing these traits in our lives is a regular habit of hearing and studying the gospel message in order to find ourselves *filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding* (Colossians 1:9).

As you study through Colossians, I pray that each week's passage will help you *find stability*, help *strengthen your faith*, and give you great *spiritual wisdom and understanding!* 

This will be a verse-by-verse Bible study in a four-day-a-week format. As a bonus, over the course of these eight weeks, you'll write out the entire **book of Colossians** in your own hand. So, choose a notebook or pretty journal for writing your verses each day.

When you begin to write, you may want to double space in order to give yourself some extra room for the suggested markings that will be incorporated in this study guide. Colored pencils are suggested, so you might want to grab some of them as well.

Each week's lesson in this study guide is intended to be completed independently **before** you watch or listen to the teaching (except Week One — Introduction). If you're sharing this study with a friend or small group the ideal method would be to...

- 1) study the week's suggested Scriptures on your own (including writing in your journal), then
- 2) listen to the teaching (privately or in your group), then
- 3) discuss the week's lesson and pray together about applying the passages to your life.

May the Lord richly bless you as you study His Word!


## **Questions for Thought & Discussion**

- 1. In **v.1,** Paul said he was *called to be an Apostle* by the will of God. Share with your discussion group one thing that you are called to 'be' or to 'do' by the will of God.
- 2. Read **1** Thessalonians **5:18** and **1** Peter **2:15**. Discuss how these verses take us deeper than merely thinking about what 'we do,' and speak to how our character 'is to be' by the will of God.
- 3. One popular notion that most people absorb from our culture is the idea that 'nothing is more important than my happiness.' How can this idea create instability in a person's life?
- 4. Most people who trust Jesus as their Savior, and get to know Him through His Word, begin to understand that their purpose in life goes beyond that which makes them happy. How can this create stability in a person's life?
- 5. Are there any other notions that we absorb from today's culture that war against the basic truth of the gospel? Explain.

## Tips for a Successful Bible Study

Remember to Pray — I want to encourage you to always begin your time in the word by yielding your heart to the Lord in prayer. Think of that phrase, *yielding*, just like the traffic sign. You give preference to the other driver to *lead the way*. That's what we want the Holy Spirit to do in our lives as we investigate His Word — *lead the way*!

Read the Whole Book — Once you've gathered your supplies (Bible, notebook and Study Guide); and once you've listened to the Introduction, it would be fantastic if you could take a few minutes to simply read the entire book of Colossians before you begin Week Two in this Study Guide. Fortunately, Colossians is only 95 verses long and you can easily read all four chapters in about 15 minutes.

### Week Two — Colossians 1:1-14

It's time to begin our verse-by-verse study of Colossians. The heading for each week (*above*) will indicate the entire passage to be studied during that week. It would be a good approach to begin each day by reading the entire *weekly passage*, and then, as you write your daily verses in your journal, concentrate on the words you are actually writing for each day.

You may or may not keep this little study booklet — but chances are, after investing your time in writing all ninety-five verses by hand, you'll keep your journal or notebook for a long time to come and treasure it!

Let's Begin...

The first two verses contain the *greeting* of this letter. In our modern letters we customarily list who the letter is written *to* at the top and who the letter is written *from* at the bottom. But I think there is something quite satisfying in getting it all out in the open at the beginning.

- To whom was this letter written?
- From whom was this letter sent?

If you have any sort of Roman Catholic background, your perspective of the word *saints* may be quite different than what Paul actually meant in **v.2**. Even if you do a quick online dictionary search for the word *saint*, you will still probably not run into the definition that Paul meant.

Since we want to let Scripture interpret Scripture, let's find a definition of who a *saint* is by reading other passages.

### Read Romans 1:7 and 1 Corinthians 1:2.

- With those passages in mind, write your own definition of *saint*:
- There are two five-letter words that the Apostle Paul often began (and sometimes ended) his letters with. These words provide a foundation for all of the possibilities that our relationship with the Lord can build upon. What are these two words in v.2?

Faith, Love and Hope: How would you like to receive a letter from someone telling you how thankful they are for you? How grateful they are that you are in the family of God? How they are constantly praying for you? WOW! That would make me feel pretty valued and loved. Especially if they hadn't even met me!

That is what I hear in Paul's heart as he began to correspond with this church body that he had never personally met.

- From **v.4**, what were two things that Paul heard about the people in this church?
- What was the reason they possessed those two virtues (v.5)?

Having faith in Jesus Christ is an obvious requirement and also a privilege of being part of the body of Christ. But Paul also heard about their love for the saints.

• Do you think loving others is an automatic part of faith in Christ?

We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus, Christ when we pray for you.

Colossians 1:3

Some people claim to *love God*, but they neglect to *love people* in any noticeable way. Read **John 13:34-35** and **Hebrews 6:10**.

- What is the expectation related to loving the saints?
- What is our standard or example related to loving the saints?

• What does God promise us when we love the saints?

Paul said the gospel was *bearing fruit and increasing* (v.6). He already mentioned *faith*, *hope*, and *love* as fruit, but we can and should expect other positive signs of the gospel in our lives as well.

Read these passages and note other positive changes people may experience when they understand and embrace the gospel:

**The Gospel:** Yesterday we read that the *gospel,* or the *good news* of salvation through Jesus Christ, was *increasing in the whole world* and *bearing fruit* in the lives of believers (**v.6**).

- Who was credited with sharing the gospel of Jesus with the Colossians? (v.7)
- What fond label did this earn him from the Apostle Paul? (v.7)
- What report did he give Paul of the Colossian believers? (v.8)

Who wouldn't like to be described as a *faithful minister*? That phrase inspires me. It challenges me to make it a spiritual goal to also be called a *faithful minister*.

• What opportunities has God placed in your life for you to be a faithful minister?

• Is there an area that you have neglected or not fully recognized as an opportunity? What practical changes are needed for you to be termed *faithful*?

*Effective Prayer:* Paul's example of praying for others is inspirational. List some of the concepts for effective prayer you find in **v.9-10** that you can incorporate while you pray specifically for people in your life:

Who is it that you're praying these things over?

This reminds us that we don't need to ask, "how may I be praying for you?" We have a universal model of praying for anyone at anytime and we can help bring stability into other's lives by praying for them.

Take a look at the phrases you underlined in purple this week. They all begin with 'in' which is a preposition — prepositions show position. These phrases describe a position or a relationship that we can enjoy with the Lord as born-again believers.

Now, list those three words that you circled in blue:

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Those words describe what Jesus has accomplished for us in order to possess that relationship.

And finally, take a look at the words circled in green! These are the benefits made possible for all believers because Jesus "transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son."

- Which of those benefits are you most thankful for and why?
- Which of those benefits do you feel in the most need of right now and why?

When we read phrases like *fully pleasing to him* and *bearing fruit in every good work*; we might feel a bit of stress creep over us, or worry that we just can't live up to a standard of Christian character that is expected. That's why **verse 11** begins with such words of assurance: ...*being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might!* 

### According to v.11...

- What are the benefits of God's power working in us?

Read Ephesians 1:18-20. According to that passage,

- Who is the power for?
- What is the *power* like?

*Giving thanks:* Paul was giving thanks and also praying that *they* would give thanks — praying they would have hearts of thanksgiving.

Romans 4:20 tells us [Abraham] grew <u>strong</u> in his faith as he gave glory to God. Jot down notes about how you would tell someone what God has done for you that you could not have accomplished yourself, thus giving glory to God and growing strong in your faith.

I therefore, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love.

Ephesians 4:1-2

### **Questions for Thought & Discussion**

- 1. Paul had heard of *the love* the Colossians had *for all the saints* (v.4). What are some ways that our love for each other could be noticed and reported to someone who didn't know us? In other words—what does love look like in the Body of Christ?
- 2. If someone had been watching you for the last 30 days, in what ways might they have noticed your *love for the saints*?
- 3. How does the content of Paul's prayers for the saints (v.9-12) modify how you pray for others in your life?
- 4. Paul prayed that the believers would be *filled with the knowledge of his will*. Read **Hebrews 5:13-14** and discuss how a Christian can cooperate with this filling.
- 5. How would you explain to someone the phrase *walk in a manner* worthy of the Lord?
- 6. Explain how the benefits described in this week's passage (*spiritual wisdom, understanding, endurance, patience*) produce stability in a person's life.

# Notes from Teaching — Week Two

## Week Three — Colossians 1:15-23

Day 1:

Absolutely everything about Christianity hinges on who Jesus is! But Christianity doesn't stop there — understanding who <i>I am</i> and what Jesus has done for me is crucial!							
Many people have ideas and thoughts about who Jesus is — they may be right, or they may be wrong. This week we'll see how the Holy Spirit inspired the Apostle Paul to describe Jesus to the Colossians and to us.							
Who HE is: Let's list what we discovered about Jesus from this chapter. Begin with the descriptions about Jesus from v.15-17.

Let's investigate that first description — image of the invisible God.							

Let's investigate that first description — *image of the invisible God*. God cannot be *seen* (John 1:18, Romans 1:20), but He wants a relationship with people like you and me who most easily understand things that we *do see*. This creates a difficulty.

### Read John 14:7-11 and Hebrews 1:3.

• Write a short synopsis of God's solution to the above problem.

Now consider the second description — firstborn over all creation. We tend to think of firstborn as the first in a series of similar beings. Maybe you are the firstborn in your family, or you married one, or you gave birth to one. But in this case Paul isn't suggesting Jesus was born first, he was declaring Him to be first in rank or highest in authority. You may have a firstborn who thinks they are the highest in authority in your family, or you may actually think you are highest in authority. So, it's good for us to ponder the fact that Jesus actually IS!

In this text, Paul moved right on to describe Jesus as the *creator*. He is *highest in authority* and also has the *authority* to create and sustain.

This is a simple but profound Biblical truth. Our faith is stabilized by allowing this understanding to saturate our minds and our decisions. For example, "since Jesus created me <u>for</u> his pleasure and his purpose, how should I handle xyz situation?"

The first description in today's verses is — head of the body. What is your opinion about the church? Do you love it? Does it frustrate you? Does it make complete sense that Jesus is the head, or do you wish He could be disassociated with the organization?

The phrase *body of Christ* may sound familiar, even common, to most Christians. But today's passage provides an opportunity to set aside familiarity and really consider in a fresh way the implications of *the body* and *the head of the body*.

Read **Ephesians 5:22-32** — as you do, try not to focus on the parallels to marriage, but instead, concentrate on the descriptions of Jesus as *the head* of the body.

- What has Jesus *already done* for His Body:
- What does He do on an ongoing basis?
- What should be our response?

The second description seems similar to yesterday's passage, with a slight difference — the beginning, the firstborn from the dead.

Something new happened when Jesus rose from the dead on that first resurrection morning — it was a new beginning! In this case, He was the firstborn! He rose from the dead and paved the way for multitudes who put their faith in Him to experience that same escape from permanent death.

### Read 1 Corinthians 15:20-23.

- What does this passage tell us about why we all die?
- What does this passage tell us about how we can be made alive?

Your answers above form a perfect segue to **v.20** in today's text. Complete the important missing words:

I don't know anyone who loves to live in hostility or agitation, do you? Humans generally crave peace, yet often try to achieve spiritual peace by almost any other avenue than through Jesus.

• What are some popular misplaced attempts people use to *be at peace* (mentally, emotionally or spiritually)?

In this letter, Paul reminded us that absolutely *everything* hinges on Jesus — even the ability to *make peace* with God.

We don't make our own peace with God, Jesus made peace for us through His work on the cross.

# Day 3: READ and WRITE Colossians 1:21-22 in your journal. With a pink pencil, put a box around 'and you' (v.21). This is a contrast to your previously highlighted phrases 'He is'. With a blue pencil, circle 'reconciled'. Until now, our study has been about who Jesus is. Today we have the unpleasant task of looking at who I am.

• From v.21, list the things that characterize who I am:

Have you ever caught your reflection in a store window, a rear view mirror, or worse, looked at your phone camera and it was looking back at you? You were momentarily horrified! "Seriously—is this what I look like? Do I have that many chins? Do I always scowl that much?"

We usually imagine that we look a little better than we actually do. In the same way, this verse holds a sober and accurate view of reality — what we really look like:

### Read **Ephesians 2:1-3**.

• What additional characteristics do you find?

### Read Romans 6:17.

What was our former condition?

The phrase *slaves of sin* reminds us of the nation of Israel while in slavery in Egypt. It's a parallel to our own condition before Jesus entered our lives and saved us from destruction. We had no ability to free ourselves, and we were helpless without a deliverer to *transfer* us to another reality.

Good News: It's so important to fully understand the bad news in order to fully appreciate the good news. So, with our hostile, slavery-inspired reflection in view — let's remind ourselves that Jesus delivered us (v.13), transferred us (v.13), redeemed us (v.14), forgave us (v.14), reconciled us (v.20, 22); in order to present us to God with what type of new appearances listed in v.22?

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☐ With a green pencil, put a heart over these words in your journal.

Once Israel was *transferred* out of Egypt, they were described as God's *holy people*. Once that was accomplished for you, the same word is used to describe you — *holy*! Not because of your effort, but because of Jesus!

Reflect for a moment on what Jesus has done for you — transferring you from a state of *alienation* — to *reconciliation*! Use these verses as a basis for a prayer of thanks. Remember, *Abraham grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God. We will too!*

Continuing in the Faith: Because Jesus made peace by the blood of his cross (v.20), and because I accepted that gift and became one of his children, my appearance before God has changed. Now I'm described as holy, blameless, and above reproach.

But today's verse begins with a word that could be troublesome - If!Misunderstanding that word could point you in the wrong direction. You could begin to think that your new life in Christ is somehow dependent on your ability to be stable and steadfast.

So let's lean on other Scriptures to help us make sure we understand.

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## **Questions for Thought & Discussion**

- 1. The Colossians believed in Jesus, but encountered influence from outside sources that attacked or twisted their core beliefs. Which of the truths in today's lesson do you feel is challenged the most in our culture or in your circle of influence? Explain!
- 2. Some of the opinions about Jesus, in the Colossian's day, were off base claiming Him to be an angel-type being, or a subordinate god, or merely a divine *influence* from God. Discuss why it is so important to accurately understand who Jesus REALLY is?
- 3. Share some implications of Jesus being the *head of the body* that you realized in this week's lesson.
- 4. Some may read **v.23** "if indeed you continue in the faith," to mean 'if indeed you stop sinning and do all Christian things properly!'
  How would you explain the truth of that verse to someone?
- 5. How can "not shifting from the hope of the gospel" (v.23) actually bring stability into a person's life?

# Notes from Teaching — Week Three

### Week Four — Colossians 1:24—2:7

**Becoming a Minister:** Last week we explored the preeminence of Jesus Christ, and along the way, we caught a glimpse of our own depravity. We were reminded of Christ's relationship, love, and nurturing toward His own Body — the Church. (The words that you underlined in purple all relate to the church.)

Now we'll note the ministry of the Apostle Paul to that same Body:

- How did he describe himself in v.23 and v.25?
- Paul's gift was given by God for whose benefit in v.25?
- How did he describe his purpose in **v.25**?
- What word did Paul use to describe the church and the ministry of the gospel in v.26?

The believers reading this letter did not personally know Paul. They had heard about Jesus from his spiritual offspring — Epaphras. But now they could hear Paul's passion for the saints as he described his calling to spread the gospel. I would guess they were inspired by him.

- Do you surround yourself with people who inspire you?
- In what ways do you think you may be an inspiration to others?

• In what specific ways might you consider yourself a 'minister of the gospel' in the sphere God has placed you?

**Rejoice in Sufferings:** Read **v.24** again. If we're not careful, it can be another misunderstood verse. We know it's NOT saying that Paul is somehow finishing what Jesus left unfinished. That wouldn't agree with the rest of Scripture. On the cross, Jesus said, "It is finished!"

- Paul was suffering with what personal attitude?
- He was suffering for whose sake?
- To whose afflictions was he likening his sufferings?

### Read John 15:18-21.

• How do you think Paul's life was a fulfillment of what Jesus said in this passage?

Is there a place in your life to suffer, in identification with Christ's afflictions, for the sake of His body the church? We're not called to be Apostles like Paul, but we are called to be *servants of Jesus*.

Meditate on this — ask the Lord to show you His plan for being *like Him* in His sufferings.

For it has been granted to you that for the sake of Christ you should not only believe in him but also suffer for his sake.

Philippians 1:29

READ and WRITE Colossians 1:27-29 in your journal.
<ul> <li>With a purple pencil, underline 'mystery' and 'in Christ'. Circle 'Him' at the beginning of v.28.</li> <li>With a pink pencil, circle 'Christ in you, the hope of glory'.</li> </ul>
Gotta Love a Mystery: The phrases underlined in purple all represent concepts that were unknown in former times — they were hidden — they were a mystery.
Consider God's covenant with Abraham — the above phrases had no presence in that first covenant — but they have everything to do with the NEW covenant, which can be summarized by the last seven words in <b>v.27</b> . Write it out here:
Jesus lives <b>IN ME!</b> This is what gives me stability for today and hope for tomorrow!
It's All About Him: We circled the first word in v.28 — HIM. It would be inappropriate to replace " <u>Him</u> we proclaim" with anything else like " <u>this</u> we proclaim" because our faith rests on a PERSON, not an idea!
<b>Everyone Mature in Christ:</b> Paul's desire was to develop <i>mature</i> followers of Christ. He wasn't interested in merely hearing <i>professions</i> of faith, but in forming <i>grown-ups</i> in the faith.
List three things that come to mind that enable a believer to grow from a child-in-Christ to a grown-up-in-Christ.

Were the words warning or teaching included in your bullet points? They were included in Paul's sentence (v.28).

• What benefit do you think *warning* and *teaching* produce in an effort to make mature followers of Christ?

**His Energy**: Take note of the effort-related words in **v.29**:

◆toil ◆struggling ◆energy ◆powerfully ◆works

As we consider the *effort* required to make something *stable* in the natural world around us, we shouldn't be surprised to also find *effort* required for spiritual stability. In Paul's life, ministry meant persecution, pain, and prison. In our lives, these words remind us that:

- ...there is **toil** and **struggle** in the life of a Christian.
- ...because we have Christ in us, we can rely on the *energy* offered by the Holy Spirit rather than merely our own *energy*.
- ...He will work powerfully in us.

Paul was toiling to proclaim Christ and make mature believers.

Ask God to meet the needs of your mission with HIS power and energy through the work of the Holy Spirit in your life.

It Takes Work: Remember those effort-related words from the end of chapter one? Paul said, [because of the gospel of Christ] "I toil, struggling with all his energy." Chapter two picks up the same theme and goes on to share the purpose of this effort.

• What did Paul want his readers to know in v.1?

Remember, he had never met these people, so apart from writing this letter, how do you think he may have been *toiling*?

Has the Lord nudged your heart to labor in prayer for someone? Do you find that you need endurance to toil in this way?

These words encourage me that it's okay when prayer feels like work! Prayer sometimes requires toil and endurance — but I need to remember that I'm laboring with the *strength* that God supplies.

Full Assurance and Firm Faith: I appreciate that Paul made his mission clear. His goals were the phrases that you underlined in pink.

We often think that *sin* is our greatest enemy, but *doubt* leading to unbelief can be tragic. Don't get me wrong, sin causes a rift between us and God, and it needs to be dealt with. But the slow creep of doubt, with it's potential to give birth to unbelief, is something all Christians need to be strengthened to resist.

Who are the people in your world that you want to see fortified against unbelief and strengthened in understanding and knowledge?

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Paul had been laboring in prayer AND now in communication so that the believers would be strong in their understanding of Jesus Christ, whom he called God's (v.2)
Jesus isn't really a <i>mystery</i> to US, but Paul wanted them to know that it's IN CHRIST where a believer finds things that are hidden from the world, namely (v.3) <i>ALL the treasures of:</i>

You've probably noticed vegetables that grow at different rates due to soil, sun, or water (or at least you can imagine this to be true). Perhaps our spiritual lives aren't so different, having been rooted in the same way, we then determine the rate at which we walk in Him.

**Abounding in Thanksgiving**: Those are the final words of our passage. Do you find that as intriguing as I do? We grow in stability by **walking** out our faith in Jesus through **thankfulness**!

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### **Questions for Thought & Discussion**

- 1. Read **Matthew 5:10-12**. Jesus and the New Testament writers held a unique view of **suffering** that can be difficult for us to grasp. How can you embrace the *blessing* or *rejoicing* part of suffering for the cause of Christ?
- 2. Paul described part of his ministry in **v.28** as warning and teaching. Read **Colossians 3:16** where you'll find that it's our ministry as well. Discuss how this is carried out in the regular, everyday life of a Christian (as opposed to the formality of pulpit teaching).
- 3. We are often prone to laziness. We like to convince ourselves that if God is *in something* it should come together quite nicely. How do the Apostle's words about toiling and laboring confront that notion? What has been your personal experience?
- 4. If a friend tells you that she's uncertain about God's Word or doubts God's intentions, how would you go about *encouraging* her heart toward full assurance of understanding (v.2)?
- 5. It's common today for people to claim a *knowledge of God* apart from the revelation of Jesus Christ. How has the first section of Colossians convinced you otherwise?

## Week Five — Colossians 2:8-23

Are you living near any of the battlegrounds that you listed? We can't always *move or change our position* in order to put distance between us and the battle. But we *can* be alert, armed, and ready.

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• Is there a specific area that the Holy Spirit has revealed to you where you must improve your guard?

In Him: You may have noticed the phrase *In Him* appeared five times between verses 6 and 11. Paul will go on to use *with Him* three times in verses 12 and 13. This is a key thought in the battle for our minds — to remember *who we are* and *how we are connected to Him*!

As we walk in Him, we will encounter the tricks of the enemy, but we are protected *in him* because He lives *in us*.

- all of God (the whole fullness) is in Jesus,

That means we have access to all the power of God as we face enemies that want to capture our thinking.

**Circumcision:** The Apostle sometimes used graphic metaphors to get his point across — for example, pointing out the spiritual metaphor associated with physical circumcision.

What was the point of circumcision?

- ⇒ It was introduced as an outward sign of the covenant that God made with Abraham and all of his descendants after him — a sort of ethnic badge.
- ⇒ But it was always intended to symbolize an inward change of the heart as a person makes a choice to surrender their life to God.

## Read Romans 2:28-29 and Philippians 3:3.

 How do these passages support the idea that our hearts are fundamentally changed when we come to Christ?

Now, let's add the reality of spiritual circumcision to our growing list of 'in Him' metaphors that help stabilize our faith:

- We **received** Christ and now have an opportunity to **walk** in Him.
- We have been **rooted** in Him so that we can be **built up** and grow.
- Even though He is the ruler and authority of all things, we have been **filled** *in Him*.
- <u>In Him</u> we have allowed our heart to be forever, spiritually, surgically **changed** to reflect our relationship with God our maker.

You've probably noticed that the words and phrases you marked in *blue* describe an action or a change that happens because of *Christ*. For example: *delivered, transferred, filled,* and now *buried* and *raised*. These all describe the *powerful working of God* (v.12) on our behalf.

**Baptism**: Here is another metaphor of death and life in **v.12** which is also a symbolic act for those who put their faith in Jesus Christ.

Paul liberally used the phrase 'with Him' to remind us that we are connected to His **power**.

- ♦ V.12 buried with Him raised with Him.
- ◆ V.13 made alive together <u>with Him</u>.

It is important to realize that the **same power** that accomplished all that we underlined in blue, is the **same power** that will help us accomplish what is underlined in pink: **walk in Him**, and become **built up**.

<b>Therefore</b> : With our second <i>therefore</i> , we again ask <i>what is it there for</i> ? Well, the Apostle has been carefully reminding us that we are not only <i>in Christ</i> , but he has triumphed over every enemy that would want to capture our thinking — therefore we can triumph too.
The purpose of this letter was to address a crisis that had formed against the church — ideas and philosophies that had seeped in and attempted to blend and blur the message of Christ. We can apply this same inspiration to modern lies circulating in our culture.
<ul> <li>In v.16 what would you guess were some of the religious/cultural expectations and ideas directed at the believers?</li> </ul>
What comes to your mind as contemporary counterparts, based on your own life experiences?

Our passage opened with 'let no one pass judgment on you'. If we read ahead a few words into tomorrow's reading we find, 'let no one disqualify you'. How do you think that disqualification could happen?

It's time to reflect on our own life now. If you have embraced any twisted ideas or philosophies of what you **must do** to make yourself acceptable to God, now is the time to really pour over these Scriptures to confront any false narratives and preach the gospel to yourself that *the reality is found in Christ* (v.17 NIV).

More Fine Sounding Arguments: Earlier in this chapter Paul warned against *plausible arguments* (*fine-sounding arguments* NIV). These are man-made religious ideas, activities, or attention to spiritual details that can consume a person and turn their focus away from Jesus and on to their accomplishments.

**Do not ... do not ... do not:** This is a perfect description of legalistic religion — often defined more by what we don't do than what we do. Adhering to rules that promise the way to *really know God,* or the way to *really please God*, they actually please our ego instead.

### Read Matthew 15:1-20.

• Write a brief statement summarizing what Jesus said about the relationship between food/mouth/words:

The Apostle Paul warned the believers in *that century*, about the false teachings coming at *them*. Now, we should consider *our* experience. To tell you the truth, I don't see much asceticism invading my world — maybe in some countries, but I don't think we Americans like to deny ourselves anything. So it's not a popular false-gospel here.

But the opposite — a message of health, wealth and happiness — is certainly a relevant foe of the pure gospel of Jesus Christ.

Let's investigate what God's Word says about the idea that God wants you wealthy, healthy, and happy. Consider these passages and note observations about how it applies to your life:

- Matthew 6:19
- Matthew 6:24
- Luke 12:15

- 1 Timothy 6:10
- Hebrews 13:5

As we wrap up the warnings from chapter two, let's remember the main point of this letter: "That you may be <u>filled</u> with the knowledge of Jesus and <u>strengthened</u> in him, so as to <u>walk</u> in a way that pleases God and become fruitful in this life." (my paraphrase)

- All self-made religious ideas have an appearance of what (v.23)?
- But they are not able to do what (v.23)?

If we desire to *walk in a manner worthy of the Lord* (v.10), it must be accomplished by **His** power working through us. Putting our energy into these *dos* and *do nots* produces no ability to stop the flesh and actually feeds it and makes it stronger.

So we ask: how do we walk in the power of God? It comes down to a new nature — a divine nature!

His divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who called us to his own glory and excellence, by which he has granted to us his precious and very great promises, so that through them you may become partakers of the divine nature. 2 Peter 1:3-4 (ESV)

When we believe in Christ for salvation we become God's children and he shares with us his divine (v.4)

- birds fly due to the *nature* of their species;
- lions are carnivorous it's their *nature*;

The strength we need to please God actually comes from the nature He has imparted to us at our new birth.

Meditate on the 2 Peter passage above today and ask God to help you grasp the reality of partaking of the divine nature.

## **Questions for Thought & Discussion**

- 1. It's been said, 'before we get someone saved, we have to get them lost.' V.13 says 'you were dead in your trespasses.' What does that mean and why is it such an important message for people to understand?
- 2. The term **Progressive Christianity** hadn't been thought of in the days of this letter, but it would have described what was happening. What types of *philosophy* and *human tradition* are wanting to merge into our churches today?
- 3. There is something about devotion to religious rules that tends to make people feel superior to others. What is the ultimate danger of excessive adherence to these types of rules?
- 4. We said that *asceticism* isn't as popular of a religious temptation today as *materialism* has become. Times change. The full title for this Bible study is "Finding Stability in a Changing World". How does the simplicity of *holding fast to the Head* promote stability in your life and in the life of the church through the ages?
- 5. Are there any 'do nots' that you grew up with that have been a challenge to weed out of your relationship with the Lord? Explain.

### Read Romans 7:5-6.

You see, as Christians, our relationship to sin has completely changed. We were once slaves to sin, but now, we no longer have to obey the pull and persuasion of sin. We have been raised with Christ, raised above captivity to our sensual desires.

What are some helpful steps as we desire to walk in our new nature in Christ, and put to death the elements of our old nature?

Step One: Reckon yourself dead to sin. This is the essence of the verse at the bottom of this page. Realize it is a possibility to not obey the voice of sin in your life.

So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Romans 6:11

**Step Two**: Take action against sin. This is the essence of passages like **Colossians 3:5.** The action of 'putting to death' or 'putting away' is what we call repentance — changing your mind, and walking in the other direction.

There *are* some practical things we can do to help us with step two, depending on what particular struggles you have...

- ❖ If it's a place, don't go there. ❖ If it's an image, turn away.
- ❖ If it's a liquid, don't drink it. ❖ If it's social media, don't click.
- ❖ If it's a person, part company.

That may sound overly simplistic, but it helps to remember that the *temptation* to sin is not the same thing as actually *engaging* in sin. Temptations will come and go throughout our life, but we no longer need to obey them — we *can* turn away!

Take off the Old, Put on the New: One more day of self-confrontation!

• From v.8-9, list the social sins to be removed from our lives:

These sins may be more difficult to detect than the sensual sins we faced yesterday, because we may classify these as *sins* in *good* standing — hardly even *sins* at all. We may rationalize that *everyone* does a little bit of deceiving, a little losing of the temper, a little repeating of information about someone.

When we don't really believe an attitude is all *that* terrible, it becomes easy to form a habit, and before we know it, we have a habit of anger, a habit of slander, or a habit of lying.

• List any social sins (which you might euphemistically call *bad habits*) that you have been struggling with but you know God has been speaking to you about 'putting off':

Confess these to the Lord.

Ask for His strength to continue to identify what is not pleasing to Him and provide you the power to take appropriate action!

Paul encourages believers in Christ to remove those habits like we might remove muddy work clothes. Then we are to dress ourselves with attitudes that are in agreement with our *new nature*!

 What are some of the habits that would be in keeping with our new nature?

There is one final concept today that should bring us hope. When we are born again, we are made *new* — that is called our <u>justification</u> before God. It only happens ONCE.

But **V.10** reminds us that we are also *being* \_\_\_\_\_\_ *in knowledge after the image of our creator.* This is our <u>sanctification</u> and it can happen EVERY DAY! One blessing of being In Christ is that He is renewing us day by day into His likeness.

## **Questions for Thought & Discussion**

- 1. Why do the attempts mentioned in the previous chapter (*do not handle, do not taste, do not touch*) bear no lasting success in helping us say no to the sins mentioned in this chapter?
- 2. Read **Mark 8:31-33**. How is Peter an example of someone who was *setting their mind on earthly things* in this passage?
- 3. Do you believe the sins listed in **v.5-8** to be equal in offense? Why or why not? Do you live and act as if they are all equal?

### Read 1 Peter 3:7.

• From that passage and from our current text in **v.19**, what is commanded of the husband?

Since wives are exhorted to fall in rank in the family unit, and husbands are exhorted to love, show honor, and not being harsh, do you think it's possible that our natural bent in our relationships is toward the opposite?

Read **Genesis 3** about the *Fall of Man,* paying particular attention to the result or the curse of sin in **v.16-19**.

• Now, write your thoughts on why we may naturally relate to one another in the family in the way we do:

We must not think of submission as slavery or subjugation. The word comes from the military vocabulary and simply means "to arrange under rank." That one soldier is a private and another is a colonel does not mean that one man is necessarily better than the other. It only means that they have different ranks.

Bible Exposition Commentary<sup>2</sup>

If you are married, is there a particular area of reverence to the Lord, through submission to your husband, that God is asking of you?

What will they think? In general, it's not a great idea to be concerned about what people think. However, in this context, Paul gave some good tips for sharing our faith with outsiders, who may be watching and thinking about our lives.

In the NIV, v.4 says "Pray that I may proclaim it [the gospel] clearly, as I should." We know that proclaiming the Gospel was on his mind. With that in view, list some of the tips he exhorted US to be thinking about from today's verses:

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It's been said that *time* is the one truly non-renewable commodity. Once that minute or hour has passed, it is never able to be retrieved. Oh, how easy it is for us to delay or postpone sharing something of ourselves, and our new life in Christ with outsiders — but we seem to find a hundred excuses.

Perhaps, it's best to stop right here, and ask God to show you how to make the best use of your time today. Write your thoughts and then do exactly what He shows you:

**Well-seasoned words**: Do you have a friend, like I do, who always seems to know the perfect thing to say, especially when I don't? Our words are important, our *talk* needs to match our *walk*. What do these Scriptures add to this concept?

- Ephesians 4:29
- 1 Peter 3:15

The Christian's walk and talk must be in harmony with each other. When character, conduct, and conversation are all working together, it makes for a powerful witness.

READ and WRITE Colossians 4:7-15 in your journal.

Today's verses contain a large amount of writing — it just happened that way due to the long closing greetings in this letter. If you need more time for writing in your journal, just shift a couple of verses to tomorrow's writing.

**Faithful Men**: Epaphras was the one who brought Paul news from the Colossians, but it seems he would not return to them very soon, so Paul sent Tychicus and Onesimus on the return mission instead. (Tychicus is also mentioned in **Acts 20:4** and **Ephesians 6:21-22**.)

• How did Paul describe Tychicus in this passage?

• How did he describe Onesimus?

A True Prayer Warrior: Since Epaphras spent time with Paul in confinement in Rome, Paul was able to observe his character and daily prayer habits. When Epaphras prayed — Paul knew it and he wanted the believers back home to know it too. He wanted them to know how genuine he was toward them.

### From **v.12-13**...

When we're inspired by someone's prayer life, we should take the opportunity to become apprentices! It would be a great waste to merely *talk about prayer*, we must become people who actually *take time to pray!* 

Today, once again, let's take up this challenge, put down our pens and actually pray for those whom God has put into our realm of influence.

- Pray passionately
- Pray Scripturally

Follow the example found in these men of God, and use the tools you have learned from this study.

To this end we always pray for you, that our God may make you worthy of His calling and may fulfill every resolve for good and every work of faith by His power, so that the name of our Lord Jesus may be glorified in you.

For the Many and For the One: Paul definitely embraced the apostolic ministry God had entrusted to him. His final instructions in v.16-17 were directed first toward an entire region of people and then his comments narrowed to just one individual.

### To the masses, he said:

"Hey, make sure this letter is circulated and read aloud and mulled over and taken to heart — that everyone would know the heart of the Lord on these matters"

## To the individual, he said:

"Tell Archippus to make sure he carries out the ministry the Lord gave him to do"

How would you feel if, out of an entire region of people, God called you out by name, saying,

"\_\_\_\_\_, be sure to fulfill the ministry that I've given you to do"?

Prayerfully, list at least two general things that you know God has stirred up in your heart to fulfill. (These should be things that any Christian could list.)

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Now, list at least two specific things that you sense God is calling you to walk out in your life — specific things that He has given ONLY to you to accomplish.

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That is the sense that I would hope to leave us all with, in this study.

- We've asked God to **stabilize** us to continue steadfastly
- We have asked that we be **filled** with the knowledge of His will
- We have considered the **walk** that God intends for us

...and now the last thing left is just to -doit!

In the same way that Paul closed this letter with, 'Grace be with you' my prayer for all of us is:

"Lord, please enable our hearts and minds to be strengthened by your power to keep the ministry you have entrusted to us in focus, to be faithful doers of your word and your will and to bring glory to YOUR name here on earth — Amen"

Have you noticed any areas that the Holy Spirit has caused a change in you during your study of this book? 6. I chose the title **Finding Stability** for this study of Colossians. What
